A comprehensive review of results for the literacy portions of the Arkansas Augmented Benchmark Exams, ITBS exams, and other data sources for the 2011, 2012, and 2013 school years for Mountain View Elementary School, grades K-5, was conducted. Data analysis reveals that the lowest average strand scores for the combined population on multiple choice items are in the strands of Reading Practical Passage in which 69.44% of possible points were earned and Writing in which 59.66% of possible points were earned. On open response items, the lowest average strand scores for the combined population were in the Reading Practical Passage strand where an average of 4.81 out of 8 possible points or 60.00% of possible points were earned and the Writing Content Domain where an average of 5.74 out of 8 or 71.75% of possible points were earned and Writing Style Domain where an average of 5.75 out of 8 or 71.88% of possible points were earned.
